Award Bid/Authorize Agreement - Fiber Optic Expansion Project - Department of Emergency Response & Communications

WHEREAS, the County of Cortland, New York, wishes to continue improvements to the infrastructure of Cortland County 911 center through the new construction of dedicated dark fiber lines; AND

WHEREAS, Cortland County's Department of Emergency Response and Communications has grant funding available from NYS Department of Homeland Security as previously approved by the Cortland County Legislature under resolutions; AND

WHEREAS this fiber optic network project is beneficial to the County as it increases the resiliency and diversity of the County's 911 center network connections eliminating the potential single failure point of the network at 60 Central Avenue, AND

WHEREAS, Cortland County has solicited proposals from qualified vendors for a dedicated turnkey fiber optic line installation between the County's facilities at 22 West Court Street and the Virgil Radio Tower located at 1914 Tower Road, Cortland; AND

II. Grant Objectives

The objectives of the Combined SFY2025 & SFY2026 PSAP Grant are:

- 1) To facilitate PSAP consolidation, regional initiatives related to 911 operations, implementation of NG911, and improvements in the operations of public safety communications, and
- 2) To develop multijurisdictional PSAP compatibility throughout the state and support statewide interoperable communications for first responders to improve public safety.

III. Authorized Program Expenditures

Listed below are the permissible costs and costs not permissible. Please note that all expenses must be completed during the period of performance outlined in *Section III. Awards*.

A. Permissible Costs

Permissible costs include, but are not limited to:

- Personnel costs solely related to operating the PSAP,
- NG911 technologies,
- GIS related expenses,
- PSAP operating expenses (such as network connectivity, phone/utility bills, software licensing, hardware and software maintenance, 911 or recording equipment maintenance),
- Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) operating expenses,
- Mobile data networks (including infrastructure, user equipment, service fees),
- Updates to existing PSAP equipment that may include installation at 911 facilities,
- Rental/lease fees for PSAP equipment (e.g., lease payments for Call Handling Equipment (CHE), or other types of 911 related equipment for operations),
- Developing, conducting and attending 911 in-service training, and Basic Certification Training, (as it pertains to the [PSAP Minimum Standards](https://www.dhSES.ny.gov/final-adopted-psap-minimum-standards)) to include recertification expenses, (<https://www.dhSES.ny.gov/final-adopted-psap-minimum-standards>),
- Dispatch Intelligent Workstations and Computer Equipment (e.g., PCs, Monitors, Computer Accessories & Dispatch Chairs),
- Equipment related to outfitting existing mobile command vehicle operations to support CAD, CHE and internal components related to dispatching. Some examples of this type of equipment can include the following:
 - Mobile hotspot, satellite hardware, and routers that can provide internet connectivity through cellular or satellite networks.
 - Computers/Dispatch Consoles/Monitors to run CAD on integrated workstations.
 - Generators and UPS system to both run and have backup power for equipment.
 - Network components, switches, gateways that integrate mobile command with 911 Call Handling Equipment (CHE), Computer Aided Dispatching (CAD), Call Recording Systems, Land Mobile Radio equipment for Mobile dispatching of 911 traffic and Call Handling Equipment (CHE) for the vehicle.

B. Costs Not Permissible

Costs that are not permissible include, but are not limited to:

- Equipment or systems with proprietary technology that is non-compliant with standards listed in this document,
- Vehicles (mobile command or otherwise),
- Land Mobile Radio (LMR) subscriber equipment,
- New construction projects (such as new building constructions and capital projects),

- Furniture (other than dispatch workstations & dispatch chairs),
- Food and beverages,
- Out-of-State conferences and trainings, and
- Debt Service

II. Grant Objectives and Program Goals

The Office of Interoperable and Emergency Communications (OIEC) seeks to ensure progress towards the goals and milestones described in the New York State Statewide Communications Interoperability Plan (SCIP) and towards communication priorities identified by the Federal government (i.e., SAFECOM Guidance). The SICG-Formula Grant Program focuses on closing gaps in the implementation and enhancement of the National Interoperability Channels. The SICG-Formula Grant Program provides a way forward for providing a safer environment for public safety personnel, integration with other emergent technologies, and the ability to establish technology and performance standards, which is the overall objective of this program.

Applicants for the Combined SFY2025 & SFY2026 SICG-Grant Program must utilize non-proprietary, open standards-based technologies, and equipment and be consistent with the published DHSES guidelines on National Interoperability Channel implementation.

Combined SFY2025 & SFY2026 SICG-Formula Program Goals:

- 1) Development and coordination of National Interoperability Channels, as well as, State, Regional, Tribal, and Local mutual aid channels,
- 2) Development of interoperable communications infrastructure,
- 3) Improvements of Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) toward Next Generation 911 (NG911) development,
- 4) Development of governance and Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs),
- 5) Development of an inventory of statewide communications resources (i.e., continuous participation in Communications Assets Surveys and Mapping (CASM) tool) and Tactical Interoperable Communication Plan (TICP¹) development, updates, and utilization.

III. Authorized Program Expenditures

A. Permissible Costs

Permissible costs include, but are not limited to:

Equipment, Infrastructure, and Technology

- Radio Frequency Systems (e.g. microwave, base stations, antennas, other);
- Subscriber Equipment (mobiles, portables, desktop);
- Towers;
- Upgrade of Customer Premises Equipment (CPEs) to IP-based technologies;
- Network components (e.g. routers, switches) as related to public safety communications;
- Telecommunication circuit setups;
- New 911 call handling equipment for the exclusive use of the PSAPs, including Automatic Location Information (ALI) displays or intelligent workstations and ALI controllers;
- CAD upgrades or replacement, including software and hardware that will perform integrated mapping functions through a CAD interface at each call taker position;
- Records Management Systems;
- Geographic Information Systems (GIS);
- Shelters;
- Gateways;
- Backup power;
- Fiber and microwave connectivity (i.e. backhaul);
- Cost of lease or lease to purchase LMR buildouts;
- LMR maintenance costs;
- Other LMR related expenses; and
- Tower site security

Planning, Administration, and Deployment Costs

- Up to 20% base salary on an annual basis of a person performing duties of a County Interoperability Coordinator (does not include overtime);
- Services relating to the development of governance and SOPs;
- Utilization of CASM and development of Tactical Interoperable Communications Plans (TICPs);
- Services relating to developing, designing, and implementing interoperability plans and network system development;
- Training and exercises pertaining to system/equipment proposal

and enhancements in interregional/interagency response readiness;

- Costs associated with the development and deployment of public safety communications systems, networks, technology, or facilities to provide the sharing of voice, data, and video transmissions.

B. Costs Not Permissible

Costs that are not permissible include, but are not limited to:

- Proprietary technologies;
- Salaries, overtime, fringe, indirect, or travel expenses associated with existing or on-going operations (with the exception of eligible portion of County Interoperability Coordinator salary);
- PSAP furniture, including dispatch furniture;
- Emergency Services IP network (ESInet);
- Paging receivers;
- Debt service or local municipal bond funding;
- Purchase of land/real estate and related taxes;
- Out of State travel expenses to conferences, meetings, training sessions, etc.;
- Recurring commercial service costs, such as cellular voice, data or leased time, except for costs directly related to deployment of Push to Talk over Cellular (PTToC) technologies (such as PTToC subscriptions, gateways or LMR devices with cellular capability);

Supporting First Responders: Governor Hochul Announces Expansion of New York's Volunteer Firefighter Training Stipend

Program Now Reimburses Volunteer Firefighters for Completing Five Additional Training Courses

More Than 4,000 Volunteer Firefighters Have Successfully Completed Training Through the Stipend Program Since 2023

Governor Hochul's Continued Investments Make New York Safer and More Affordable

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced New York's Volunteer Firefighter Training Stipend program is expanding to offset costs for five additional training courses available to volunteer firefighters. New York State created the program to strengthen the volunteer fire service and address recruitment and retention challenges by offsetting the costs of required training that individuals need to become a firefighter. This expansion will help reduce obstacles preventing volunteer firefighters from advancing their careers. Since 2023, more than 4,000 volunteer firefighters have successfully completed training through the program.

"Since taking office, I've been laser-focused on making New York safer and more affordable. By expanding the Volunteer Firefighter Training Stipend program, we're doing both – cutting costs for those who serve while enhancing their lifesaving skills," **Governor Hochul said.** "This program makes critical training more accessible, allowing our volunteers to grow in their careers without sacrificing their ability to provide for their families. I'm proud to invest in our volunteer firefighters who put their lives on the line to keep New Yorkers safe."

The new stipend-eligible courses and course equivalencies are:

- **Firefighter Survival: Self Rescue:** This course teaches firefighters how to rescue themselves if they become trapped or compromised during a fire incident. Stipend Amount: \$250
- **Firefighter Assist and Search Team, and Rapid Intervention Crew:** These courses are designed to train firefighters in the critical skills needed to rescue fellow firefighters who are trapped or in distress during an incident. Stipend Amount: \$350
- **Fire and Emergency Services Instructor 1, Fire Officer II, and Firefighter 2:** These courses are advanced leadership and instructor development programs. They aim to enhance the leadership capabilities of fire department members and improve their effectiveness in incident command roles, ultimately contributing to the safety of firefighters. Stipend Amount: \$500

These five courses build on the catalog of trainings that are already stipend-eligible: Basic Wildland Fire Suppression (**\$250**) Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations (**\$750**), Fire Officer 1 (**\$1,000**) and Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus/Interior Firefighting Operations (**\$1,250**). Since the inception of the stipend program, completion of the Basic Exterior Firefighting Operations, and Interior Firefighting Operations courses have increased by 20 percent and completion of the Fire Officer I course has risen 35 percent.

New York State Homeland Security and Emergency Services Acting Commissioner Terry O’Leary said, “New York’s volunteer firefighters are critical parts of the fabric of communities statewide and they put their lives on the line every time they answer a call to protect those communities. As New York continues to face challenges with volunteer recruitment, the stipend program has resulted in marked increases in class completions, which has brought additional firefighters to departments across the state. Thanks to the leadership and support of Governor Hochul, this stipend program expansion will continue to help volunteer departments recruit and retain members, keeping themselves and their communities safe.”

New York State Fire Administrator James Cable said, “The Volunteer Firefighter Training Stipend has contributed to an increase in the number of firefighters completing eligible training courses. The fire training courses included in this expansion of the program focus on firefighter safety and survival skills along with leadership and instructor development, all key areas promoting effectiveness and safety both during training and on the fireground.”

New York State County Fire Coordinators Association President Bill Streicher said, “Now more than ever, it is vital that we support our volunteer fire organizations to boost recruitment and retention within the fire service across New York State. These stipends serve to promote and strengthen the fire service across our state while providing a small stipend to firefighters who participate in these classes, to better prepare themselves to serve their communities.”

New York State Association of Fire Chiefs CEO Bruce Heberer said, “Proper training keeps our firefighters and our communities safer and at a time when our volunteer agencies are strained, and every dollar counts. The Volunteer training stipends are a vital resource of income to the members of our fire services so that they can focus on their training, instead worrying about how they are going to make ends meet if the training causes them to miss work, allowing them to continue serve their department and take care of their home life!”

Association of Fire Districts of the State of New York President Joseph Badala said, “Investments in our fire districts are investments in our communities as better services make our state safer for everyone. We thank Governor Hochul for her efforts to provide departments with the resources they need to do their work safely and strategically.”

Additionally, a local fire training stipend may be authorized for the completion of any state Office of Fire Prevention and Control (OFPC) training course or equivalent, as determined by OFPC, up to \$500. Courses must have been completed on or after August 31, 2023, and applicants must be a member in good standing as determined by their department. Stipend applications must be submitted to OFPC-Stipend@dhses.ny.gov.

Approximately nine million New Yorkers, nearly half of the state's population, are served by volunteer firefighters. Yet in recent years, more than 75 percent of these departments have reported a decrease in the number of individuals willing to volunteer and serve. This shortage is further compounded by the increased operational responsibilities beyond fire protection, including vehicle accidents, medical emergencies, hazardous material spills and weather-related rescue operations. At the same time, calls for service have increased 29 percent from 1997 to 2020.

In addition to the Volunteer Training Stipend, Governor Hochul has sought to strengthen and stabilize the state's volunteer fire service by supporting the capital needs of volunteer fire departments through the Volunteer Fire Infrastructure & Response Equipment (V-FIRE) Grant Program. Through the first round of V-FIRE funding in October 2024, the state provided \$25 million to 88 entities to support the construction of new, or renovation of existing fire stations, classrooms, meeting spaces or training centers; installation of exhaust and decontamination systems; and/or the purchase of equipment such as firefighter Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), PPE washers and dryers and firefighter rehabilitation equipment.

Comprehensive County EMS Plan Law - Key Dates & Next Steps for County EMS Coordinators

Dear County EMS Coordinator,

The New York State Department of Health is sharing an update with County EMS Coordinators regarding the County EMS Plan law (Chapter 703 of the Laws of 2025).

As enacted, the law will take effect June 19th, 2026, and County EMS Plans will be due six months after the effective date, which means County EMS Plans must be submitted prior to December 19th, 2026.

This law was designed to support thoughtful, coordinated EMS system planning at the county level. While the statute outlines the overall requirement for counties to develop comprehensive EMS plans, the Department recognizes that clear guidance and structure will be important to making this process meaningful and manageable.

To support counties, the Department of Health is finalizing a County EMS Plan Framework, which will be released shortly. This Framework will outline recommended components, suggested formatting, and general information about the submission and feedback process. We encourage counties to begin considering how they may approach the planning effort locally and to start thinking about potential stakeholders and information sources. To ensure local efforts align with the statewide structure, counties may want to wait for this framework to be released before investing substantial time into the project.

In addition, where possible, the Department may share relevant information to assist counties in building their plans. This may include data already collected by the State, information related to EMS agencies operating within your county, training and workforce trends, and other materials that could help inform local planning efforts. Our goal is to make this process collaborative and to reduce unnecessary duplication of effort by providing counties with foundational information that may already exist at the State level.

This initiative is an opportunity to strengthen collaboration between counties, EMS agencies, Regional and State EMS Councils, and the State. A well-developed county plan can help identify strengths, gaps, and opportunities for improvement while supporting long-term system stability and patient access to emergency medical care.

Additional guidance, including the County EMS Plan Framework and submission details, will be distributed in the coming weeks.
